Weekly Crop Report

Missouri farmers moved ahead rapidly with spring planting as favorable weather prevailed in most areas. Days suitable for fieldwork during the past week averaged 5.6, the most since the new crop season began. The topsoil moisture supply was reported as 1 percent very short, 11 percent short, 82 percent adequate and 6 percent surplus. The driest areas are the southwest and south-central districts with moisture ratings of over 20 percent short, while the highest ratings are in the east-central and southeast districts with about 13 percent surplus moisture. Field Crops Report: Ninety-seven percent of the intended corn acreage has been planted, over a week ahead of a year ago and 2 days ahead of the 5-year average of 95 percent. Progress ranges from 97 to 100 percent planted in all districts except the northeast, east-central and southcentral districts where planting is 92 percent or less complete. Eighty-six percent of the corn has emerged, slightly ahead of last year and normal. Corn condition is reported as 1 percent very poor, 4 percent poor, 30 percent fair, 53 percent good and 12 percent excellent, virtually unchanged from a week earlier. Cutworms have been found in a few corn fields but damage appears to be minor. Sixty-five percent of the expected soybean acreage has been planted, a week ahead of last year and 2 days ahead of the average of 61 percent. Bean planting is the most advanced in the northwest district with 86 percent in the ground, while 30 percent or less is planted in the southwest and south-central districts. Thirty-three percent of the soybeans have emerged, ahead of last year but a few days behind the average of 41 percent due to the later initial plantings and recent cooler temperatures. Sorghum is 63 percent planted, nearly a week ahead of last year but 3 days behind the 5-year average of 67 percent. Progress by district ranges from about a third planted in the northeast and south-central districts to 84 percent in the southeast and 93 percent in the northwest percent excellent. Winter wheat is rated as 1 percent very poor, 6 percent poor, 28 percent fair, 50 percent good and 15 percent excellent, similar to a week earlier. Ninety-eight percent of the crop is headed or beyond, similar to normal. Only the northwest and north-central districts have less than 94 percent heading. Fifty-one percent of the wheat is turning color, ranging from 4 percent in the northeast district to 89 percent in the southeast.
