Weekly Crop Report

A week of hot, dry weather is causing stress to row crops in the driest areas. Reporters indicate that rain is needed soon to maintain yield prospects. Condition of crops is showing some decline but ratings in most areas are still predominantly fair to good. The topsoil moisture supply was reported as 16 percent very short, 36 percent short, 47 percent adequate and 1 percent surplus, a general decline for the State as rainfall was minimal in most areas. The driest areas are the northwest and west-central districts where topsoil moisture ratings fell to 85 percent short or very short. The State averaged 6.1 days suitable For fieldwork with all districts averaging over 5 days. Field Crops Report Eight-one percent of the corn is silked and 26 percent has reached the dough stage, virtually the same as a year earlier and the 5-year average. Development ranges from 47 percent silked and 7 percent in the dough stage in the northeast district to 100 percent silking and 62 percent in the dough stage in the southeast. Many farmers in the driest areas are concerned that the moisture supply will be insufficient for full development of ears. Corn condition declined to 3 percent very poor, 10 percent poor, 30 percent fair, 48 percent good and 9 percent excellent, still well above the comparatively low ratings of a year earlier on this date but slightly below 2 years ago. Thirty-seven percent of the soybeans have reached the blooming stage and 7 percent are setting pods. Podding is 2 days behind last year and 4 days behind the 13 percent average, as the delay in the earliest soybean plantings continues to be reflected in development progress. Condition of the crop is rated as 3 percent very poor, 9 percent poor, 37 percent fair, 45 percent good and 6 percent excellent, down moderately from a week ago but well above a year earlier. Twenty-nine percent of the sorghum is headed, 3 days ahead of last year but slightly behind the 5-year average of 33 percent. Condition of the crop is rated as 1 percent very poor, 8 percent poor, 36 percent fair, 49 percent good and 6 percent excellent, down slightly from last week but well above last year at this time. Ninety-three percent of the second crop of alfalfa hay has been cut, a few days ahead of the both last year and normal, while the third cutting is 13 percent complete, equal to normal. Ninety-eight percent of other hay is cut, over a week ahead of last year and normal.
