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Missouri Weekly Crop Report

Dry weather continues to erode the potential for row crop yields in much of the State but considerable variation exists by area. Crop conditions show sizeable declines in the northwest, north-central, west-central and central districts as the drought expands beyond the northwestern and west-central counties. Crops in many eastern counties and particularly the southeast district have fared better with timely rains. The topsoil moisture supply was reported as 34 percent very short, 34 percent short and 31 percent adequate and 1 percent surplus, with the northwest and west-central districts showing ratings of 97 percent short or very short. Subsoil moisture is rated as 31 percent very short, 42 percent short and 27 percent adequate. An average of 5.9 days were suitable for fieldwork, varying from 2.8 days in the southeast district to about 6 or more days in the northern two-thirds of the State. Ninety-three percent of the corn is silked, 57 percent has reached the dough stage and 21 percent is dented, similar to the progress of a year earlier and the 5-year average. Development ranges from 33 percent in the dough stage or beyond in the northeast district to 83 percent in the west-central and south-west districts and 98 percent in the southeast. Corn condition for the State as a whole declined to 12 percent very poor, 21 percent poor, 30 percent fair, 31 percent good and 6 percent excellent, still above a year ago for this date when 45 percent was rated poor or very poor. Corn in some fields of northern and western counties is considered hurt beyond recovery with only limited potential at this time. Farmers are already cutting the poorest fields for silage. Sixty-four percent of the soybeans have reached the blooming stage and 26 percent are setting pods. Development is 3 days behind last year and 6 days behind the average of 74 percent blooming and 37 percent podding. Condition of the crop is rated as 9 percent very poor, 16 percent poor, 37 percent fair, 34 percent good and 4 percent excellent, close to the rating of a week ago but with declining ratings in the driest areas and improved conditions where rain was received. Most soybeans in the dry areas could still show significant recovery if rain is received soon but moisture is critical for the current pod-filling phase. Fifty-seven percent of the sorghum is headed and 10 percent is turning color, about the same as last year but 4 days behind the 5-year average of 66 percent headed. Condition of the crop is rated as 4 percent very poor, 9 percent poor, 48 percent fair, 33 percent good and 6 percent excellent, as an improved outlook in the heavy sorghum-producing area of the southeast district approximately offset the decline in the driest areas. Forty-five percent of the third crop of alfalfa hay is cut, 2 days behind last year but ahead of normal. Some of the main alfalfa-growing region is expected to have little or no third cutting due to the moisture shortage.
