
## MISSOURI STEER (HEIFER) STOCKER FORMULA 2/17/2025

Monday's Missouri Stocker formula consists of **3333 (3705)** head with a weighted average weight of **552.79 (545.46)** lbs. and a price value of **338.26 (296.42)**, 0.36 higher (2.87 lower) than a week ago. This a rolling seven day calculated weighted value which combines all Feeder Steers reported by MDA/USDA Market News Service weighing from 400-649 lbs. in the Medium and Large 1 and Medium and Large 1-2 frame and muscle classifications, including all comment cattle except Brahman X. Heifer values are in parentheses.

## MISSOURI WEEKLY CATTLE AUCTION SUMMARY

Total Receipts: 23,671 Week Ago: 43,214 Year Ago: 44,848

Compared to last week, feeder steers and heifers sold unevenly steady to 5.00 lower. The supply of feeders was light. Winter weather became an issue and complicated transportation of live-stock this week, resulting in several sales cancelling or having very light offerings. There has been some interest in grass calves for grazing already but buyers are being selective and want health programs, some quality and condition that does not include a lot of flesh before they are willing to get aggressive with bidding. As a whole the cattle complex has been under a lot of pressure the last couple weeks, which isn't all that out of the ordinary for the month of Feb. although the specific current reasons this year may be different than past years. Despite the unique circumstances occurring, the fundamental facts of low supplies and great beef demand remain and are still providing optimistic hope for producers and even with some losses over the last two weeks, prices remain near record highs at this time. A few stick out sales this week included 28 head of 411 lb. steers at Joplin Regional Stockyards which sold for 436.00. Kingsville Livestock Auction sold 102 head of 550 lb. steers for 380.50 and 86 head of 667 lb. steers for 309.00. Lolli Brothers Livestock sold 41 head of 715 lb. steers for 297.25. Tina Livestock Auction sold 59 head of 750 lb. steers at 287.25. A load of 809 lb. steers at Kingsville Livestock Auction sold for 274.50. ON the heifer side 49 head of 537 lb. heifers at Tina Livestock Auction sold for 329.75. and Lolli Brothers Livestock sold a load of 713 lb. heifers for 270.25. Boxed beef cutouts were lower for the week. Choice closed on Friday at 314.70, down 7.17 and Select closed at 307.14, down 5.76 compared to last Friday. Negotiated feedlot sales as of the Friday afternoon report totaled near 40K head as of the 2:00 report cutoff time. Live sales were mostly 3.00-5.00 lower and dressed sales 7.00-8.00 lower. Live sales were reported mostly at 203.00 and dressed sales at 320.00-321.00. The Missouri Stocker formula consists of 3333 head with a weighted average weight of 552.79 lbs. and a price value of 338.26, 0.36 higher than last week. The steer/heifer spread is 41.84 per cwt.



In the Western Cornbelt negotiated cash trade has been slow on moderate demand. Compared to Thursday in the Western Cornbelt, live FOB purchases have traded steady at 203.00. Last week dressed delivered purchases traded at 328.00.





## WORLD AGRICULTURAL SUPPLY AND DEMAND EST

**WHEAT:** The 2024/25 U.S. wheat supply and demand outlook is for slightly higher domestic use that leads to lower ending stocks. Food use is raised 4 million bushels to 970 million, as wheat flour grind during the October-December quarter was up 2 percent from last year as indicated in the NASS Flour Milling Products report. Projected ending stocks decrease 4 million bushels to 794 million but are 14 percent above last year. The season-average farm price is unchanged at \$5.55 per bushel.

The global wheat outlook for 2024/25 is for slightly larger supplies and higher consumption but lower trade and ending stocks. Supplies are raised 0.6 million tons to 1,061.3 million, primarily on higher production for Kazakhstan and Argentina. Global consumption is increased 1.8 million tons to 803.7 million on higher feed and residual use for the EU, Kazakhstan, Thailand, and Ukraine. World trade declines 3.0 million tons to 209.0 million with export reductions for the EU, Mexico, Russia, Turkey, and Ukraine. The largest import change is a decrease for China of 2.5 million tons to 8.0 million on a continued sluggish import pace. These would be their lowest imports in five years and China was the leading world wheat importer last year at 13.6 million tons. Projected 2024/25 ending stocks are lowered 1.3 million tons to 257.6 million, on a reduction for China that is only partly offset by increases for Russia, Kazakhstan, and Ukraine.

**COARSE GRAINS:** This month's 2024/25 U.S. corn supply and use outlook is unchanged from last month. The projected season-average farm price is raised 10 cents to \$4.35 per bushel. Global coarse grain production for 2024/25 is forecast 1.8 million tons lower to 1.492 billion. This month's foreign coarse grain outlook is for reduced production, trade, and ending stocks. Foreign corn production is forecast down with declines for Argentina and Brazil. Production is reduced for Argentina reflecting a cut in yield, as heat and dryness during January and into early February reduce yield prospects for early-planted corn in key central growing areas. For Brazil, the corn production forecast is reduced as slow second-crop planting progress in the Center-West lowers yield prospects. Major global trade changes for 2024/25 include smaller projected corn exports for Brazil, Ukraine, and South Africa. Corn imports are cut for China but raised for Vietnam and Chile. Foreign corn ending stocks are reduced reflecting a reduction for China. Global corn ending stocks, at 290.3 million tons, are down 3.0 million.

**OILSEEDS:** U.S. 2024/25 soybean supply and use projections are unchanged this month. The season-average soybean price is projected at \$10.10 per bushel, down 10 cents from last month. Soybean meal and oil prices are unchanged at \$310 per short ton and 43 cents per pound, respectively. Global 2024/25 soybean supply and use forecasts include lower production, higher use, and lower ending stocks. Production is reduced for Argentina and Paraguay due to persistent heat and dryness during January. Brazilian soybean production is unchanged at 169.0 million tons. Beneficial weather in the Center-West is boosting soybean prospects, but drier weather in the south accelerated soybean development at the expense of yields. Global soybean crush is raised on higher crush for Brazil. The increase is driven by favorable crush margins, strong biofuel demand, and the pace of soybean meal exports to date. Partially offsetting is lower soybean crush and soybean meal exports for Paraguay on lower supplies. With negligible changes to soybean exports, global ending stocks are reduced 4.0 million tons to 124.3 million on lower stocks for Argentina and Brazil.

## MISSOURI WEEKLY HAY SUMMARY 2/13/2025

The state was quickly reminded that it is still winter. Temperatures dropped and winter precipitation passed over the state this week although snow fall wasn't as much as had been forecast in most areas. Even though the heavy coats had to come back out most farmers were willing to take it as it froze the mud back up and made getting around to feed a bit less of a pain. There continues to be a surplus of hay available for sale throughout the state. Hay prices are unevenly steady to weak. The supply of hay is moderate to heavy, and demand is light to moderate.
